Lenten Journal, Week Two: What “beasts” have you encountered, internally or externally?

Last Thursday I got the call that comes to almost everyone, eventually, the one none of us ever wants to get.

It was from my sister, with the news that her sweet daughter, Annalisa, her only child and my only niece, was in the hospital and it did not look good. Annalisa suffered from a chronic disease for many years and it suddenly looked like she might die of it.

She was gone within twenty-four hours. Annalisa was warm-hearted, fun-loving and remarkably generous. She loved sci-fi movies and cats, and she loved to laugh (among many other things). And she loved her two uncles, and we loved her.

I can hardly bear the thought of the world without her in it. Of never seeing her again. Of not seeing another Star Trek movie with her. Of never making her laugh, or hearing her laugh, ever again.

In light of the steadily mounting death toll from COVID, I was already aware that I had been holding a lot of grief inside. But now my grief has a name, and a face. The person who has passed is someone I knew, someone I loved dearly.

Not surprisingly, the grief I now feel around losing Annalisa has affected me altogether differently than the ambient grief that had slowly been building up inside of me over the last year.

Within minutes, all the things I have learned about grief over the course of my life and my ministry came flooding back, partly because those lessons were hard won, and hard earned, so they run very deep. And partly because I was starting to feel some of those familiar things again.

Like the fact that grief is not some decorous emotion one feels upon losing a loved one, because it's the right and seemly thing to feel. Rather, the experience of grief is much more like having a wild animal running around loose inside of you. And not just a nice sleek one you can partially domesticate, like a ferret, but a big powerful one, more like a buffalo that stomps around, bellowing threats and causing havoc.

And, yes, grief does unfold in stages, but they're not discreet or linear. That is, they don't play out one at a time and in a straight line. You don't get to finish up the denial stage before you move on, say, to depression, which you then get to process for three uninterrupted weeks.

Quite often you feel several of these stages, sometimes even all of them, all at the same time. Then, one day, you may feel like you're finally just inches from reaching the acceptance stage where babies make you smile again and music makes you want to dance again, only to wake up the next day so depressed you can't even tie your shoes, and you spend the day walking around aimlessly inside your house, in your slippers, fuming with anger and bargaining with God.

It's a full contact sport, is grief. And here in the United States, I often think that as a people we're not very good at it.

I say all these things, and I share this story with you, my story, because in light of everything we've lost in the last year, and all the people we have lost in this span, some of them people you have known and loved dearly, I suspect that you, too, have been carrying around a heavy load of grief inside.

So, if you wake up and find yourself wanting to yell at God but can't quite account for why you feel that way; or you just want to stay in bed when you have other things to do; or you realize while you're cooking dinner that you're too sad to care that you burned the chicken, there is likely a reason for that.

Here is some good news; it's a theme I've shared before but it bears repeating now: you're not alone.

Some very good friends called me from Minnesota last night to say they were sorry for my loss. They wanted to hear the story of how Annalisa passed. They had known her for many years and they were shocked to learn she had left us--that she had been stolen from us, as I think of it.

At the end of our conversation, they said they wished there was more they could say, more they could do, to support me and to support my sister, Susan, whom they have also known for many years. They were frustrated by their sense of not being able to do much to help mitigate our pain.

But then they said, "We're with you."

I thanked them for the call and told them that was the very best thing they could say, and the very best thing they could do, even if that was only from a distance. Because such companionship and solidarity is perhaps the one thing that matters most in times of crisis and loss.

Because, really, at the end of the day, we're all just walking each other home.

Clerk's Report

At its February meeting, the session:

1. Approved the collection of the 5 Cents a Meal offering in 2021.
2. Designated Sharon Lytle as the Commissioner for the October presbytery meeting.
3. Discussed what criteria should be used to decide when to return to in-person worship.
4. Approved the purchase of new video equipment to allow live streaming of worship services with funds to pay for the purchase to come from earnings of the general endowment.
5. Allocated \$6,000 from the PPP Fund to be given to organizations assisting other during the pandemic with the specific organizations to be identified by the Community Engagement Team.
6. Authorized payment of \$250 to the Swannanoa Valley Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Corporation with the funds to come from the tithe of the Waldrop bequest.
